The information and communications technology (ICT) sector in Colombia is expanding rapidly. Companies have significantly increased their investments in digital tools and services, recognizing the exchange and management of information as fundamental pillars for organizational success.

A study by the Ministry of Information and Communications Technology (MinTIC) revealed that ICT companies in Medellín and Bogotá experience annual growth rates of 3% and 4%, respectively.

However, this dynamism faces a crucial challenge: the gap between the demand for talent in the sector and the supply of skilled professionals. In 2020, the ICT sector generated 36,184 job openings, but only 26,017 students possessed the necessary competencies to fill them. This highlights the urgency of promoting technical and professional training to ensure more young people can access these opportunities, and companies can meet their talent needs.











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Conectad@s: The Response to the Challenge

To bridge this gap, IYF implements Connected, an innovative initiative that equips young people aged 18 to 29, who have completed secondary education and are interested in working in the IT field, with the technical skills, confidence, and comprehensive preparation needed to excel in the ICT sector.



What does Conectad@s: offer?

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Intensive Training

300 hours of training distributed over 12 to 14 weeks, with daily 4-hour sessions from Monday to Friday.



Virtual Modality

Synchronous and asynchronous sessions, with support from specialized tutors to ensure learning.



Result-Oriented Approach

A training program designed to directly address labor market needs, connecting participants with real employment opportunities.



Thanks to the support of the **PriceSmart Foundation and Google.org,** this program is implemented in Medellín, Bogotá, and their metropolitan areas. Conectad@s aims not only to reduce the human talent gap but also to promote gender equity and diversity in the ICT sector.











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The program addresses the human skill gap through three components:

Google Professional Certificate	A training program to obtain a professional Google certificate in IT Support, Data Analysis, Project Management, or UX Design, through a combination of online and in-person courses.
Socioemotional Skills	A curriculum that develops socioemotional and life skills, as well as career guidance through IYF's "Discover Your Vocation" (DTV) initiative.
Complementary Activities	Activities and skill-building opportunities to help young participants consolidate knowledge and prepare for job searching, entry, and retention in the formal IT sector.
