MEETING OBJECTIVES

This dissemination event is intended to:

- Share the findings from the recent, cross-sectoral YouthMap assessment, particularly the perspectives voiced by youth around the country on issues related to education, employment, health, citizenship, and youth at risk;
- Highlight promising practices and models focusing on positive youth development, and the assets that youth themselves can bring to bear on the challenges they face;
- Promote discussion of individual and collective actions which could be taken by various stakeholders to promote positive youth development and relevant programming for youth across sectors in Senegal.

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MEETING OVERVIEW

In recent years, Senegal has seen rapid population growth and a significant "youth bulge". In 2010, there were approximately 2.7 million young Senegalese ages 15 to 24, comprising 21 percent of the population, and this number was expected to increase by almost 25 percent by 2020. In addition, various youth cohorts are at risk – including out-of-school and unemployed youth, those affected by trafficking, and others victimized or affected by the conflict in the Casamance. In order to better inform programming for youth in Senegal, USAID/Senegal launched a cross-sectoral youth assessment through YouthMap earlier this year. The assessment built upon the theoretical framework introduced in the World Bank's 2007 World Development Report: Development and the Next Generation, which posits that youth face major life transitions as they move from adolescence to adulthood in the areas of education, going to work, adopting healthy lifestyles, forming families, and exercising citizenship. The International Youth

Foundation (IYF) implemented the YouthMap assessment with support from USAID and in partnership with Dalberg Global Development Advisors (Dakar Office) and a team of international and local researchers, including youth. This meeting will be the first in a series of learning events focusing on youth circumstances, assets, and opportunities in Sub-Saharan Africa. The meeting will look at both the "supply side" of programs and services available to youth and the "demand side" of youth perspectives, challenges, and aspirations. Youth voices will be a central part of the dialogue to inform key stakeholders and engage young people as active participants in designing programs to promote positive youth development and shaping their own futures.

As a concrete next step to build on the YouthMap assessment, the meeting will solicit ideas about critical steps stakeholders could take both individually and collectively to promote positive youth development in Senegal. In addition to sharing knowledge from the YouthMap assessment report, the forum is intended to contribute to the development of coordinated action and partnerships to support these efforts.

YouthMap is a four-year project designed to assess youth circumstances as well as support promising programs and practices in positive youth development in Sub-Saharan Africa. Through YouthMap, IYF is conducting holistic assessments on the conditions of young people and the status of the youth-serving infrastructure in up to eight countries in the region. Based on this comprehensive information, the YouthMap Innovation Fund will provide support to replicate promising practices, address gaps in existing programs, and scale up innovations that are working for youth in the areas of education and employability. The program is supported by a US\$10 million agreement with USAID and is being implemented by IYF, USAID Missions, and local partners in target countries. YouthMap is a project of Youth:Work.



About Youth: Work

Funded by USAID's Office of Urban Programs, Youth: Work is a Global Development Alliance Leader with Associates assistance mechanism that USAID and other U.S. government agencies can utilize to access the youth employability programs, services and expertise of IYF. Under this five-year program, USAID and other entities can choose to expand or replicate successful IYF programs as well as to design collaboratively new programs tailored to local realities and priorities. The goal of Youth: Work is to improve livelihood opportunities for disadvantaged young people around the world by supporting: improved access to high-quality, integrated training to increase youth employability; greater youth employability and entrepreneurship support services and networks; and an improved enabling environment for youth employability. Youth: Work also promotes cross-project learning and networking events; targeted training and capacity building; rigorous monitoring and evaluation; support for partnership and leverage development; and other special initiatives.
